her babies. By the time they borrowed a carrier, the mother and kittens were gone.





Feline Immunodeficiency Virus

Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV) is a slow virus that affects a cat's immune system over a period of years. FIV is a cat-only disease and it cannot be spread to humans or other non-felines. FIV+ cats most often live long, healthy and relatively normal lives with no symptoms at all. The virus is not easily passed between cats and cannot be spread through shared litter boxes, shared water or food bowls, mutual grooming or mild aggression. The virus can only be transmitted through serious penetrating bite wounds, which are extremely rare, except in free-roaming, un-neutered tomcats. If properly introduced, a

Friends Like Me is a program to provide emergency medical care and treatment for cats and kittens who are sick, injured or have chronic illnesses, such as diabetes.





Vaccinating Your Cat

Cat vaccinations consist of core and non-core vaccines. Core vaccines include: distemper, upper respiratory viruses and the rabies vaccine.

Examples of non-core vaccines are feline leukemia (FeLV), feline infectious peritonitis FIP), and feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV). These vaccinations are used when the at's lifestyle places it at risk for acquiring these diseases.

raditionally, core vaccines were given yearly, but the American Association of Feline ractitioners has revised their guidelines to recommend the core vaccines every three years for adult cats. his is because it was discovered that some degree of immunity lasts longer than one year.

Vhen deciding to vaccinate your cat, assess the risks of encountering contagious disease. Outside cats and ounger cats are more vulnerable and may still require a higher protective level than an every-three-year accine may convey. Here at Cat Depot, all cats get vaccinated yearly because the risk of infectious disease a group setting is higher.

uestions to ask yourself when considering the frequency of your cat's vaccination: Does my cat go out on e lanai where it could encounter stray cats through the screen? Does my cat ever board at a kennel? If I ork with sick cats, could I bring home infection to my own cats?

Glenda takes pleasure in the companionship of humans and enjoys staying close. So why isn't this girl adopted? Perhaps, it's because she is diabetic.



Diabetes strikes 1 in every 400 cats, though recent veterinary studies note that it has become increasingly common. Symptoms in cats are similar to those in humans.

Signs that your cat may be diabetic:


- Change in appetite (increased or decreased)
- Weight loss
- Excessive thirst/increase in water consumption
- Increased urination
- Urinating in areas other than the litter box
- Unusually sweet-smelling breath
- Lethargy
- Dehydration
- Unkempt hair coat
- Urinary tract infection

Diabetes is considered a manageable disorder – and many diabetic cats lead happy, healthy lives. Some even go into remission.

Since arriving at Cat Depot, Glenda has lost four pounds (doctor's orders), and Dr. Howard Rand is providing acupuncture treatments in an effort to reduce or eliminate her need for insulin. In the meantime, she continues to take her insulin without fuse, and hopes that someone will love her as she is

My name, Lucia, means "graceful light," which is very in keeping with my disposition. My caregivers say I am a sweet, endearing, and sensitive gray tabby, four years young. Like my friend Harper, I have struggled to survive. I was rescued from Caboodle Ranch, along with 700 other





I was weak, undernourished, and unable to provide milk so my four babies were bottle-fed. Only two, Bean and

"Pet me," she seemed to say, reaching her good leg through the bars. Her delicate condition made it difficult to do anything but give gentle loving pets and surround her with stuffed toys.

Carter and his mother continued to visit Ninja, and Carter's father also got involved. Although it was their first rescue experience, the family never hesitated to help. 
