

Lip commissure to eyelid transposition for repair of feline eyelid agenesis – say again? Apparently, this is the fancy new surgery that the vet said would fix all my eye problems. You see, I was born without upper eyelids. The hair above my right eye was constantly rubbing my cornea, causing ulcers, and it hurt so bad!

When I was discovered at Sarasota County Animal Services in September, it was obvious that I would greatly benefit from the expert care at Cat Depot. I was brought there, and of course, everyone fell in love with me immediately. Who could resist these rugged good looks and my boyish charm?

The surgery itself wasn't exactly fun – they removed the skin around my right eye and then moved the tissue from my cheek and lips from the corner of my



mouth up to my eye. The end result is that my lip became my new eyelid, but more importantly that meant no more painful hairs scratching my eye! It took a little while to heal, which was really no time at all compared to the six years I had lived with this awful condition. Once I healed, I felt like a whole new cat.

And the best part of my story... I was only available for adoption for two weeks before my forever family took me and my buddy Dickens home. We are now known as "Turkey" and "Gravy" and we couldn't be happier. I am so grateful for my friends at Cat Depot and all the generous donors that make it possible to save cats like me.

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Kittens, Kittens, Kittens: 'Tis the Kitten Season!

Winter is here at Cat Depot! The air is chilly, the nights are longer... and there are kittens everywhere...?



The timing of kitten season is dependent on environmental factors such as daylight duration and temperature, so the exact dates will fluctuate based on location. Cats living in northern, colder climates have a shorter kitten season, while cats who live in tropical climates or indoors may breed yearround. In Sarasota, we experience a long kitten season, with a few "dry" months in the winter when relatively few kittens are born.

In addition to the hundreds of cats and kittens admitted by Cat Depot during 2018, over 200 more were brought into the shelter from local and regional municipal agencies.



On November 20, 2018 there were already 80 kittens in our foster program when 28 kittens were transferred to Cat Depot from Manatee County Animal

Services. Most of these kittens were very young and in need of health care. Without the supportive care of the medical team and the commitment of our foster volunteers, many of these kittens would not have survived.

As these kittens transition out of foster homes and into "forever homes", it is important to remember the people who made this possible: the medical and intake staff, foster parents, and every community member, donor, and volunteer who helped Cat Depot develop the resources and the ability to assist so many cats on such short notice.



Nine-year-young **Farah**, Cat Depot's Meow Mayor, was rescued from a horrific hoarding situation and would be happiest if adopted as the only cat. People are superstitious about black cats which may explain why Farah is the longest feline resident currently at the shelter. Looking for a lap-sitting kitty that adores chin scratches? Farah's all love.





Ever wish someone who is exceptionally sweet, loving and looks like **Lenny** would greet you at the door? Consider adopting this two-year-old who was found on someone's porch and brought to Cat Depot. This kitty enjoys companionship and if a feline friend is at the top of your list, Lenny is your guy.

The Cat's Meow

Think your cat's meows, chirps, howls, and purrs are gibberish? Think again. Your cat, if you listen closely, is communicating with you.

Following are some of the more common sounds cats use to express their emotional well-being:

A meow is first uttered by kittens in need of their mothers and mostly used with humans. Much like with their moms, it means they are in need of food, are lonely or ill, but also is used as a welcome hello.

A purr, the most enjoyable, is a deep, hypnotic rumble when nesting in your lap.

A chirp or trill is a birdlike sound used by the mother to get the kitten's attention and may be used for the same reason with humans.

A chatter is often uttered in predatory excitement when staring at a bird outside your window.

A hiss, sounding like steak on a grill is often accompanied by an arched back, puffed hair, flattened ears and indicates a cat is ready to fight.

A yowl, a drawn-out moan, is used cat-to-cat indicating discomfort, worry, or territorial concerns. If incessant, see your veterinarian.

A caterwaul or scream is used by females in heat or during a cat fight.

Snarls and growls are indicative of fear, anger, or territorial threats.

Some cats, by nature or breed, are more talkative but being able to interpret a cat's meows can give you a better understanding of your feline's needs and may allow you a one-on-one cat chat.




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
