

Passing the Scratch Test

In order to peacefully cohabitate with our feline friends, finding a scratching post that best meets your needs and those of your cats' is essential. Scratching enables cats to stretch and visually mark their territory via scent glands in their paw pads. Scratching also provides emotional releases (stress or excitement) and exercise for senior cats.

There are a vast array of scratching posts to choose from so taking note of your cat's scratching behaviors

can save you time and money. If your cat likes fabrics with texture, purchase sisal and rope wrapped posts. If your cat scratches horizontally, choose an inexpensive cardboard scratching box while vertical scratchers might prefer the classic upright post. Multi-level condos offer retreats for kittens or cats to exercise, sleep and play. Purchasing a nubby outdoor industrial rug is also an equally effective alternative to fulfill kitty's scratching needs.

Expect some trial and error when teaching your cat to use a scratching post. Should kitty begin scratching an undesirable area, rub or spray catnip on the post and move it to the area where he plays and sleeps. When he's successful, give him lots of love and attention or reward him with a treat. Never punish a cat, a firm no is all that is needed.

A well-chosen and properly placed scratching post can fulfill an indoor cat's natural instincts. Share a much-needed peace pipe by also learning, via your veterinarian, how to safely keep kitty's nails trimmed.

Double the Love




Cat people know that the stereotype of the independent, aloof cat is not always accurate. Cats are frequently cuddly, friendly, and even clingy. It's not only humans that cats form relationships with - they can also bond with other cats. Close social bonds are the building blocks of community cat colonies, but they can form inside homes, too.

A "bonded pair" means that there are two cats who are so close that separating them would be detrimental to their well-being. You may have seen it in your own home: when one cat passes, its buddy goes from room to room, trying to find the friend again. The survivor may even become lethargic or stop eating. Most bonded pairs have spent years together in a home forming close ties.

They are often related cats, siblings, or parent-child pairs, however not every pair of siblings will bond. Like humans, some pairs of cats just need more personal space.

Some cats are extra special - like adoptable(s) Charlie – part of a bonded pair with Cinder. Charlie recently donated serum to help save a young, orphaned kitten's eye. So not only does Cinder rely on Charlie for company – he is a hero to young Paprika who would have otherwise lost both eyes to damage and infection.

How can you tell if your cats are bonded? Some clues are the ways they interact. Cats with close bonds engage in mutual grooming, casual affection, and may eat, sleep, or play together. You will see them rub their bodies against each other when they walk, and go "nose-to-nose" to sniff each other's faces. These bonds provide stimulation, security, and companionship to the cats, especially when their humans are busy or absent.

Updated Programs

Here at Cat Depot we are dedicated to creating, not only a better today for our cats, but a better future as well. We have been working on updating and expanding our education, volunteer, and outreach programs. We are partnering with local youth groups and organizations and have focused our outreach efforts on family-friendly events in order to begin instilling an appreciation for the human/animal bond at a young age.

For example, as a part of an initiative to better serve Sarasota and its cats, we created a new program for high school students to become more involved in social issues. Students will learn how to collaborate to host a food drive for Cat Depot's Community Food Bank which provides over 1,500 pounds of food to income-qualified cat owners and to many of the area's community cat caregivers each month. This program allows cat owners to provide for their cats and in turn keeps these cats in their loving homes. Our student volunteers will learn the importance of helping people in the community and, as a result, will also help save more cats.

With the restructuring of the volunteer program, longer term volunteers will enjoy new roles and responsibilities to better serve our mission. Volunteers are an integral part of Cat Depot and assist as front desk greeters, ambassadors, adoption assistants, cat caregivers, and outreach event advocates. Volunteers are crucial to our day-to-day operations, fundraising, and awareness in the community and are not only invested in the future of Cat Depot, but also the future of Sarasota County.

Marketing Refresh


